RAPPING WITH WAYNE

August can be a quiet month for some clubs but, having visited six clubs during this period, I know that it is far from a rest month. I continue to emphasise that Lions and clubs are the heavyweights in our organization as you alone serve our communities. This is most evident in club visits, to the extent that I do wonder how, in some low member number clubs, all the service work is achieved. I am in regular contact with Vice DG's Dave and Carole so I am aware that they are reporting the same for their visits. Congratulations to you all on your achievements to date; please keep up the good work.

There can be no more important education subject than English. Literacy skills are crucial to pupils' learning for all subjects, yet too many pupils fall behind in their literacy early on. In most cases, if they can't read securely at seven, they struggle to catch up as they progress through their careers. One in five children do not achieve the expected literacy levels by the end of primary school- 100,000 pupils last year- rising to one in three pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds. One in seven adults, as many as five million people, lack basic literacy skills.

When International President Wayne Madden introduced the "Reading Action Program" (RAP), my immediate reaction was that it would apply to children in third world countries, perhaps to a few but not many in the UK. How wrong I was! The above paragraph shows statements from Ofsted; I find them amazing. The RAP is a call to action for every Lions club to organize service projects and activities that underscore the importance of reading, and address specific needs related to illiteracy within their own community. District Officer Glenys Sanders, chair of the Youth Team, will be expanding on RAP in our next newsletter; do please give

thought to how your club can help in your community, and let DO Glenys and DO Beverley (PR) know what action you are taking.

October is our Sight month, with the actual World Sight Day being Thursday Oct 11th.



What is your club planning for your community? A blind-folded walk for the town mayor and possibly the newspaper editor (which usually guarantees publicity) or visiting a school to show children how difficult it is to complete normal day-to-day activities without full vision. Simply giving out Sight leaflets in your town centre raises both awareness of sight issues and your club's profile. Please report your activities to DO Beverley (PR), together with relevant photos.

Most Zone chairs will have held their first meeting by now; these are open to all club members but it is important that particularly club presidents and also secretaries attend. It is an opportunity to develop the zone team, to discuss experiences between clubs and learn from other Lions, both the good and not so good encounters. Remember that your club gains strength by acting as a team, and this can be enhanced by being part of your zone team.

I thank clubs for the welcome that you have given to Dave, Carole and me during our visits. We are there as part of the district team, and that team exists to support you and your club. Please make use of any district officer; usually we can help and have a positive input in some way.

The schools are awarded stars for their achievements. Towards the end of the school year the club president visits the schools and presents them with a prize cheque of money which will go towards an environmental project at the school.

I believe this to be a good, easily managed, community project that is not only environmental but provides an "in" with the schools for other projects and the Lions are known to the children in those areas. This may be a project that other clubs would wish to adopt.

I encourage all Lions to Reduce - Reuse - Recycle and would be interested to hear of other environmental projects within the district.

The group of girls comprised Alie from USA and Anna from Sweden, hosted by Rick and Pam Talbot in Gnosall; Aino from Finland, hosted by Carole Hodgkinson and Edward Godden in Stoke; Lea from Germany and Tamara from Georgia, hosted by Pauline and Bill Hodgkinson also in Stoke and Natascha from Switzerland and Natsuko from Japan, hosted by Dave and Chris Handley in Stone. During their visit the girls were able to meet several local Lions and take part in a number of joint activities and day trips.

For anyone who has not considered hosting a Youth Exchange visitor, why not think about it for next year? The youngsters all speak English and are selected by their local Lions Clubs to be ambassadors of their own countries. They are keen to learn about the British way of life and our culture and, in return, give their host families an insight into to growing up and living in another country. Attending the Youth Camp also provides them with the opportunity of mixing with young people from many nationalities – a total of 28 countries were represented in Liverpool this year.

One of the Lions Clubs International Purposes is 'to promote and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world' and it would be difficult to find a better, or more enjoyable, way of achieving this.

Thoughts from the Editor's Chair.

I know I am going to annoy people but here goes, these are my personal opinions.

I sat down on Saturday night to start putting the Newsletter together, wondering how I was going to sort through the mountain of emails. Considering that this publication is about the most exciting and worthwhile service organisation in the world I must say that I have never been so bored. I can see know why professional journalists are driven to drink. Remembering that the things I get for inclusion are quite often based on pieces that are presented to local newspapers for inclusion, I understand why not much gets published. Faced with a mass of information which is competing for limited space, any piece sent for publication must have a difference it must make the journalist smile, laugh or cry. It must be something that will appeal to the public. Journalists and newsletter editors are all working to tight deadlines, so they are going to include those pieces that catch their eye and those pieces that can be included without too much work. Give them an eye catching headline, even if they are not going to use it, the headline will make them read your piece.

Know what you want to say and say it; keep it simple, no jargon. Write it as if you were talking directly to someone. You can be sure; if I find the piece uninteresting (and I care about Lions) the journalist will be similarly affected. Editor
