




District Governor's Newsletter



BIKES AND BOTTLES IN MALAYSIA



Just before Christmas I returned from a holiday in Malaysia. I went to visit my son, who is currently working in Kuala Lumpur (KL). I took this as a great opportunity for visiting local members of the Lionistic Family. My first visit was to the Lions Club of Bukit Kiara in KL. As you can see from the picture it was a full blown business meeting, with most of the members dressed in their exceptionally smart blazers. I had been introduced to the Club by PDG Sam Leong, following email contact. I was fascinated to hear the Club members talking about their work in and around the city. Each day, they and other clubs in KL arrange for the feeding of nearly 100 of the poorer residents. The Club VP then talked about a health vetting programme they were carrying out on the following Sunday on an offshore island. They were working in partnership with several local organisations and hoped to be able to have local health education volunteers based on the island. The cost of providing bikes for these was about £35 each.

My ears pricked up at this and after getting confirmation of the cost I asked the Club to leave the matter of funding to me.

Fast forward to the Wednesday night following my return to Urmston and I put the suggestion to the Club that Urmston fund the bikes. Everyone was in favour and agreed to send £200 to Malaysia by way of my son Gareth. A real result money leaving the UK and fast forwarding to Malaysia,

the Family of Lions is truly worldwide.

As most of you will know I am a Message In a Bottle bore and could not resist explaining the concept to our Malaysian friends. I got an email from PDG Sam just before Christmas to say that his Club, Kuala Lumpur North had agreed to adopt the scheme and could I send him some bottles. My son Gareth will be taking them back to Malaysia when he returns after Christmas.

It really is a small world, and I have not told you about the evening I spent With a bunch of Lions from KL North at a Chinese Karaoke evening, have I? Another time when I have more time. It was fantastic going to somewhere where local Lions are working on projects which we help to fund. Cataract clinics, KL Lions Eye Health Clinic, etc. are all there, making a difference can be seen to work, the benefits of the funds we send abroad are palpable.

DG Says Get yourself Noticed in 2013

I hope that all Lions in our district enjoyed Christmas and greeted the New Year with celebrations; Maureen and I wish everyone a happy and healthy 2013.

The first half of our Lionistic year saw welcomed recruitment of new members, approximately 46, which included 7 in the new branch club in Hednesford. The Sandbach club "revival team" worked hard and it is planned to badge the first new members this month. These achievements prove that we do have clubs that, for a variety of reasons, are attracting new members. Often it is difficult to pin-point the specifics but clubs will increase their potential for recruitment if Service work is publicized locally and Lions are "seen around the town", clubs have a good social calendar and members have fun, with friends and acquaintances invited to participate in these occasions. Club workings need to be open and democratic with "everyone being aware of everything", all members should have some specific responsibility such as club officer or be on a committee, and whilst there will often be differences of opinion, they should be openly discussed and, if applicable, the majority decision accepted. We must guard against any differences or personality clashes smoldering over a period and then igniting with dramatic results; ideally they need to be resolved at an early stage, after which normality resumes and the club moves forward with greater strength.

Remember Signature Projects? The main aim of these is for clubs to put a "stamp" on their community by doing something that everyone would recognize as being a significant "Lions" initiative. We have already achieved this with Message in a Bottle. We have a proud affiliation with many Sight programmes and for the future, with our Youth projects. Signature Projects takes one element each from Sight and Youth, and these are Lions Eye Health Programme (LEHP) and Young Leaders in Service (YLIS).

LEHP promotes healthy vision and raises awareness of the causes of preventable vision loss; it encourages sight tests which may save

sight through the early detection and timely treatment of diabetic eye disease, glaucoma and age-related macular degeneration (AMD). Whilst there are several ways to promote this locally, it can be as simple as handing out our Sight Tests leaflets (available from MDHQ at £5 per 100) to the public in your town centre.

YLIS recognizes young people who provide significant levels of service to their communities, and is open to those between the ages of 11 and 18 years. The scheme would apply to scouts, guides, cadets and other similar youth groups, to youths caring for a family member with a disability, or caring for the homeless. It could be youngsters assisting with public health in the community such as creating awareness of substance abuse, they could be preserving the environment by clearing litter or, closer to home, they may be helping Lions with their activities. They are presented with a Silver Seal Award for providing at least 50 hours of service in a twelve month period, or a Gold Award for at least 100 hours. Many of you will know eligible youths who are already achieving these hours; with just a little effort, you could promote deserved recognition for them. And the bonus of YLIS is that you become indirectly linked to their parents, who are potential members for your club!

Having referred to YLIS, the great news is that we have four potential Leos clubs in our district, with a tenacious Frank Marnell, our Leos & YLIS district officer, pursuing each relentlessly. It would be great to get just one established as, apart from the obvious benefits to the youths themselves, it creates a link with schools or youth organizations which opens paths to our established and worthy competitions such as Peace Poster, Young Ambassador and the Young Musician contest. Whilst we can be proud of our achievements in these events, statistics show that entries are from only a few clubs; if we can double the number of participating clubs, then our chances of winning at MD level greatly increase.

Following the disastrous effects of the major floods at St Asaph, I wrote to all BS clubs, asking for donations. The letter was also circulated to all other districts in MD105 and, although the circumstances were not relevant for a LCIF Emergency Grant, I did request financial assistance from the MD Disaster Fund. Taking into account £10,000 received from the latter and £2,000 from our BS Emergency fund, the St Asaph Appeal fund currently totals £33,000. Many thanks to those clubs which have already contributed and to those who have yet to consider the Appeal at your next meeting, please give generously. President Kevin and treasurer Tom of Prestatyn & Rhyl club sit on the St Asaph Relief committee and it has been confirmed that 362 homes were evacuated of which 200 families lost all their belongings and of those, around 75 had no contents insurance. It is estimated that the timescale for recovery for these unfortunate people will be between 1 and 3 years; the local Lions will be providing their Service for as long as necessary, and they will need as much money in the Appeal fund as possible.

Finally a reminder that our District Convention is only about 10 weeks away; it is both a fun and business occasion, and ideal for meeting old

friends and making new ones. I always emphasise that the social aspect of Lionism is very important for every club, and this also applies to Convention. The Host Night is an optional fancy dress event with a "Black & White" theme; there will be sights not to be missed as many clubs compete for the titles of Best Fancy Dress and Best Performance. The Banquet & Ball is equally enjoyable but in "sensible" attire. The business day on Saturday will be interesting and varied, recognizing achievements but importantly looking at forward plans. Phil Nathan MBE and Past International Director is our guest for the weekend; he is an excellent and motivational speaker and is looking forward to his first official visit to BS.

I congratulate all clubs on the Service provided to communities during December; I am sure that it was a demanding but rewarding period. I am positive about our District as we move forward into 2013, and I wish all Lions well in building their clubs and fulfilling our motto "We Serve".
