

raising initiative launched in the summer holidays by Southall School teacher, Andy Faichney, to enable students to participate in life enhancing outings they may otherwise not get the opportunity to experience.

Ironbridge Lions are long-time supporters of Southall School in Dawley,

porters of Southall School in Dawley, where a high proportion of the students suffer from autism and other learning difficulties. Their latest support came after hearing how Mr Faichney had kick-started the fundraising with a gruelling nine day sponsored cycle ride from John O'Groats to Land's End.

Mr Faichney, who is aiming to raise a staggering £20,000 through a variety of fundraising events, got the idea for the initiative after taking several students

from the school on a trip to London last year.

"None of the students had been away from home before and the experience of doing and seeing things that others just see as part of everyday life has made a massive difference to their confidence and even their level of independence in some cases", he said.

"All the activities we have planned, once we have raised the money to make them a reality, are designed to promote and improve the life skills of the students. Trips could entail something as simple as us hiring a minibus and taking the children to a town centre where we can show them first-hand how to ask and pay for a cup of coffee in a shop. Or, being more ambitious, they could involve spending a night away from home."

June Softley, President of Ironbridge Lions, said: "We have a long association with Southall School and we believe Andy's aim is very commendable. We are therefore glad to be able to make a donation to this very worthwhile cause."

The DG's Bit

International

Lion Barry Palmer, our International President has asked us to look at doing something for Diabetes in November as it is Diabetes awareness month and Thursday 14th is Diabetes Day.



Re-Zoning

<u>What!</u>? Is that what I hear you say? You should know the DG Team has had the topic raised during their visits to Zones and Clubs and I am very aware that with no information people often become suspicious and unsettled. So, some facts.

- 1. As you may recall, in April 2011, we did not have a Lion willing to serve as Zone Chair for Zone 5.
- 2. The decision was taken to break Zone 5 up with its clubs distributed within Zone 3 and Zone 6.
- 3. Also, since then, we have lost both Hazel Grove and Sandbach Lions Clubs.
- 4. We currently do not have a Zone Chair for Z7.
- 5. At the DG Team meeting with the Zone Chairs that took place immediately after the August Cabinet some of the Zone Chairs stated that a number of clubs and they themselves were finding the existing Zone arrangement geographically hard to work with.
- 6. We also have clubs that would benefit from greater mutual support.

So What Has Been Done?

- 1. The District Constitution has been checked and it states quite clearly that any decision as to the number of zones, the number of clubs within a zone and the arrangements of the zones within a District is a matter solely for the DG. Any proposed changes should be advised to the membership via the District Convention and they can only be brought into effect at the start of the Lionistic Year.
- 2. Long serving Past District Governors, who may have experienced or who may have had to consider re-zoning themselves have been consulted as well.
- 3. I am now putting **my** thoughts on paper for the 1st and 2nd VDGs to consider, with the aim of giving **our** thoughts to the Zone Chairs after Cabinet on 17th November for their comments.
- 4. Zone Chairs will be asked to **consult** with those clubs directly affected and advise those clubs indirectly affected by any proposals and to feed their comments back to the DG Team.
- 5. A decision will be announced in time for Convention 2014; of course that decision could be one of 'no change'. We will have to see the outcome of the consultation process.

One More Thing! Of course, the simple answer might be to re-instate Zone 5 as was, but before that is viable I would need to be certain that we had lions willing to serve as ZCs for the next 2 terms; that is 2 lions servicing for 2 years each so that a stable position can be held for 4 years during which time it should be possible to identify and encourage future ZCs for a re-instated Z5.

Autumn Forum

The Autumn Forum has come and gone. It was quite well attended, although there is always room for more. The initial feedback the GLT and myself have had was that the 'workshop' approach worked very well indeed and that, in the main, the topics offered were well presented and informative. We know there are things we can do to improve; there always are! So we need you, the membership who went, to let us know what you thought about the topics offered and your view of the day overall now that you have had time to sleep on it. Please let PDG Lion Shirley or any one for the GLT know. My thanks to PDG Lion Shirley for all her hard work to pull the 9 workshops and 2 presentations together and to all the presenters and discussion facilitators for their efforts to stimulate good discussions. One last comment on the Forum – if you went, during AOB at your Zone and Club meetings, please tell your fellow lions your thoughts (the good, the bad; perhaps we will forget the ugly).

Final Thoughts

As I write this I am sat in the meeting room straight after the Council of Governors has finished business for the day and, as promised during my various chats to Cabinet and Clubs, I am looking at a consolidated list of projects that preceding Councils have committed Lions to over the years. It is quite extensive and I will go over it carefully and spread the relevant information through Cabinet, Zones and Clubs in the usual way.

Despite having to cope with a debilitating condition since the age of nine, Laura faces up to all her life challenges with a smile. The bike is an incredible piece of machinery and we were delighted to see how well she is handling it already."

Laura said: "I am very grateful to Ironbridge Lions for their donation, and of course to Rachel Morris who, by selling me one of her old bikes, has enabled me to get a bike sooner. Through the "Ican2" sports and leisure programme I am able to take the bike on the track at Oakengates and I am really starting to find out what it, and I, can do."

After the old lady passed away, Lion Mick went to a local children's home to find out about the need for shoes. He saw for himself that in a world of hand-me-downs, new shoes would be very much appreciated. He went out and bought shoes for two needy children to put a smile on their faces.



Lion Mick always said that when he died, he wanted people to do the same-to buy shoes, not flowers.

Following the sudden death of Lion President Mick in March this year, members of Stoke on Trent Lions Club decided to set up a memorial fund for Mick, starting with donations from his friends, relations and fellow Lions.

They contacted a local food bank which serves many needy families and found out that shoes for the children would be a Godsend in today's difficult economic climate.

Wynsors Shoes in Hanley were then approached and readily agreed to accept Lions vouchers in return for children's shoes. They were so impressed with the scheme that they agreed to a 5% discount on all shoes purchased with the vouchers.

The project is now in full swing and a number of children are back at school sporting a pair of brand new shoes. Stoke on Trent lions will ensure that funds are topped up whenever necessary.

Stafford Lions marked World Sight Day with a display in the Guildhall Shopping Centre, in conjunction with Vision Express. There was equipment and technology on show that can help visually impaired people, loaned by Action for the Blind. John May from Lichfield Talking Newspapers was also there. Stafford Lions collected used spectacles on the day, and have netted 3,210 pairs of glasses and 320 used hearing aids since they took over the duty from Stafford Rotary. STONE LIONS BLINDFOLD WALK TUESDAY 8TH OCTOBER, 2013

As one event in a series of events held worldwide to commemorate Lions International World Sight Day which, by tradition, is always the second Thursday in October, Stone Lions Club organised a blindfold walk in the Town Centre on 8th October. It was based on the Market Square and involved walking the High Street with stops for photos outside the two opticians who collect used spectacles for us.



In addition to a very good turnout of Club Members, the Town Mayor took part, walking blindfolded escorted by President Glenys Sanders and two Lions in lion costumes; Guide Dogs for the Blind joined us with, in addition to a full adult dog, an eleven week old puppy – Guide Dog of the future! To help raise funds for them Lions Hilary King and Peter Leatt took over two collecting boxes and managed to get £63.60 in just under an hour! We were also very pleased to have the support of Lions Rick and Pam Talbot of Gnosall Lions Club. Two local schools, Walton Priory and Christchurch First brought children along, alternating wearing blindfolds, to give them the understanding of what partially sighted and blind people experience.

During the walk used spectacles were collected from the two opticians and from passers-by. The end result of adding these to the collection was that we were able to announce that the Club had reached a total of 10,000 pairs passed on for recycling through the procedure set up by Lion Mike Ward nine years ago.
