What's International President Lion Barry Been Up To?

This month our IP Lion Barry Palmer has focused on the levels of PR that lions all over the world are achieving. He has been concentrating on not only the amount but also the quality of the coverage. Included in the links on the LCI web page is one from our own multiple-district focusing on Truro Lions Clubs reporting on their supplying of a LifePak Defibrillator in the city's county hall that



was covered by the West Country press. Also on the PR front may I ask that clubs keep DO Lion Bev Stanyer and DO John Whitehouse up to speed with your latest PR offerings that have been published or you would like to get published in the Newsletter and The Lion Magazine.

Autumn Forum.

As it happens, PR is one of the workshops on the timetable of events at our Autumn Forum which is planned for Sunday, 20th October at the Mercure Hotel, Whitchurch Road, Chester this year. I say our Autumn Forum as that is exactly what it is. Each and every Lion in our District is invited. We are trying a workshops approach because you, our Lions asked for workshops in preference to lectures.

Workshops work best when the more experienced come along and share their experiences with those who are not quite so experienced; so please don't think our Autumn Forum is only intended for the newer members of Lions. The full details of the programme are published in the District Mail, but in essence I hope you will join with me for the welcome, which will be followed by a short general interest topic, then the first session of workshops, another general topic and then the second round of workshops. We then break for lunch for which we have negotiated a £9.95 three course deal. The afternoon kicks off with another general interest topic, then we go into the final session of workshops and round off with a final get together to look at the 'what worked, what didn't work and what Lions would like covered next time'.

Your District Global Leadership Team are also looking to broaden the Lions skills information sessions to meet my requested improvement in our forward planning and succession planning. We are looking to run a pilot scheme in one or two zones in the near future – so watch this space. If your Zone is not selected, please don't think we do not care about you, but we are trying to be practical and to minimize travel needs, costs etc.

May I just say thank you to all those lions who travelled to Stone, as well as those resident in Stone, who all helped make this years' Service of Rededication the success it was; a serious part of our Lionistic Year, but with a light touch. On behalf of Lion Chris may I also thank those who contributed so generously to The Newlife Foundation at the Service of Rededication – the collection raised £117.08p.

May I also thank the LPs and members of those Lions Clubs who have had DG Team visits so far this year for the truly warm welcomes Carole, Chris and I have received wherever we have gone.

Little Orme Lions are extremely proud of Tony's fund raising challenge.

On Sunday 18th August 2013 Little Orme Lion Tony Wilkinson the most senior member of the group took to the air, no

not a broadcast on the radio or a flight in an aircraft, Tony was suspended in a harness on Europe's longest zip wire 500 ft. high in the air travelling well in access of 70 mph up to a maximum speed of 115 mph along the 1 mile zip wire at Bethesda North Wales, this was all in aid of the St Davids Hospice Llandudno. Tony has raised in excess of £200 to date for the hospice.





Stafford Lions Respond to 2 Appeals in September.

Stafford Lions Club were approached by a Senior Advice Line Worker from the Carers Association of South Staffordshire (CASS) after she discovered that one of her young carer's had been left without a bed following a fire at their rented accommodation. The young carers mother (51), a stroke victim, was living in rented accommodation with her son 16 and daughter 19 where the fire destroyed her son's bedroom.

Stafford Lions responded by immediately giving the CASS worker a grant to ease the family's difficulties. To avoid problems with delivery waiting times she purchased a bed from Katherine House Hospice Shop and used the rest of the Lions grant to buy bedding. CASS bought school clothing so that the young carer could start school on time.

Stafford Lions were also approached by the Midland Heart Organisation who were working with a woman with disabilities who needed help with redecorating her flat as these physical disabilities were preventing her from doing it herself. To the delight of this vulnerable person our Lions Club bought paint and a team of 3 Lions swiftly decorated her accommodation.

SANTA COMES EARLY TO TELFORD

At the beginning of September Santa paid an early visit to Telford College of Art and Technology to take delivery of a brand new sleigh in readiness for the Christmas season. The sleigh building which has been overseen by Telford Lions club has involved a number of local enterprises.

The students from TCAT built it in their workshop and so impressed the Lions that they have provided a shield to be



presented annually to the apprentice who impresses most. This year it went to Lee Beamish who worked on the sleigh both in college time and also in his own. Three local councils provided grants towards the funding of the build while costs where kept down by the generosity of local businesses who donated much of the materials needed.

Representatives of all those involved were invited to TCAT to receive certificates of appreciation from the Lions and for the presentation of the finished sleigh. The Mayor of Wellington, Graham Riley, attended and spoke about value of the link with the college and shared memories of previous years following the sleigh at the town's lights switch evening.

The old sleigh had done good service for many years but its age was starting to present maintenance problems. Once the club had decided to build a new version Lion Peter Edwards took the lead role liaising with the college and persuading local businesses to donate or discount the cost of materials.

Lion President Kevin Hopley said "It has been a great community effort and the finished sleigh will bring joy to countless children for many years to come."

The donation will cover the cost of training Rusty (pictured) a cocker spaniel and miniature poodle cross, for over one year; born on 21.06.13, he is currently being socialized with a family with three small children and attends regular puppy training courses.

Maureen is extremely grateful to the clubs of BS who donated to her selected charity; it was a tremendous effort and will transform the life of Rusty's new keeper for many years. She plans to keep the district updated with Rusty's progress.
