Police cadets honoured by Ironbridge & Severn Gorge Lions

Eight young police cadets from Telford have won recognition for their outstanding service to the community.

The youngsters were selected to receive Young Leaders in Service Awards, after completing a two year programme that encourages young people to participate in youth volunteer opportunities and continue their service to the community.

Presenting the awards at the town's Malinsgate Police Station, June Softley, President, said: "On behalf of Ironbridge Lions it gives me great pride and pleasure to present these awards to a group of young people who, on top of their school work and other commitments, have found, and willingly given, an extraordinary amount of time to working in

their local community in a variety of ways."

Three Gold Seal Awards and five Silver Seal Awards were made. Seen in the photograph are gold winners Angela Kelly (18) and Abigail Jones (18), with silver winners Jake Garbett (18), Nicky Emery (19) and Nikita Homer (18).

Superintendent Nav Malik, Divisional Commander of Telford and Wrekin Police, said: "All this year's award recipients started community service at aged 16 and passed out in September 2013. They come from diverse backgrounds and have all worked hard to achieve these awards. The fact that every one of them is now either in employment or at university is testament to the benefits of participating in volunteer activities."



FLINT & DISTRICT LIONS CLUB BEDDING PLANT PROJECT

Flint Lions recently celebrated their 12th year of supplying bedding plants to customers within their local community. Orders totalling £10,500 were received and on Friday 16 May 2014 - 2184 trays of bedding plants, 76 large planters and 264 Hanging Baskets were delivered to the gymnasium of a local school and stored overnight

ready for packing.

At 6am the following morning members of Flint & District Lions Club, their

partners and helpers began making up orders for 360 customers, which were delivered in a number of hired vans.

The operation was concluded by 2pm in the afternoon when some very tired but happy people went home

ZONE 10 HAS A FLING!

The Carers Association South Staffordshire (CASS) has been a cause that clubs across Zone 10 have made one of their projects for a number of years and this year Lions once again funded a big party night—the "Spring Fling".

Planned to coincide with Carers Week and the first national young carers awareness day on 13th. June this event was held at Tamworth and hosted nearly 150 young carers from 6 to 18 years of age.

As well as all the usual youth club activities special events included bouncy castles, a photo-booth, face painting, hands on arts and crafts, live music making sessions and probably the world's loudest disco!

The atmosphere was electric with so many excited young people having a well deserved break from the strain of constantly juggling school, their personal life and looking after a dependent mum, dad, brother or sister.

Carers Trust estimate that there are 700,000 young carers and this awareness day was intended to highlight the extraordinary role of these young people, the challenges they face, the importance of supporting them and ensuring that their own futures are not limited.

On the evening Zone 10 Lions were thanked by the CASS chief officer for their continued support but the best accolade came totally unsolicited from a little girl who said "I've had the best night of my life!"

In true Lion tradition the event finished with a massive party buffet, votes of thanks and loads of raffle prizes before all the happy youngsters were transported back to various parts of Staffordshire to resume their often unsung roles as young carers.



Rugeley Lions support Diabetes UK at Tescos

Last year Lions Clubs across the United Kingdom helped Diabetes UK raise nearly £25,000 in a weekend collection at Tesco Stores and this year they were again asked to support them over the weekend of $13^{th} - 15^{th}$ June to help raise £300.000 to:

The letter below was from a pupil at Endon High School Nr Leek. Leek Lions club have been and are continuing to support the school project to Kathmandu Nepal.


The Endon students involved are absolutely fabulous and a credit to both school and parents. They are also using their efforts in the YLIS project.




Kathmandu 2014

LIONS CLUB MEMBER OPENS ASDA SUPERMARKET

Cutting the ribbon to open a new supermarket is a sign of celebrity status as surely as an appearance in the tabloid newspapers.

But now, an international retail giant has decided to shun celebrities in favour of associating its brand with the local Lions Club.

Asda chose a Lion to open its first store in the Staffordshire market town of Uttoxeter after consulting the club as part of a search for a local hero to cut the ribbon at the store's official opening.

The supermarket chain said they were looking for someone who makes life better for people in the Uttoxeter area, someone who goes that extra mile for a particular cause or person, or an individual renowned for their local charity

The Lions Club did not come up with a suggestion, but Asda had been asking around and decided that a Lion was the best person to do the job.

Steve Shields has served three terms as President of Uttoxeter Lions and as District Officer for Speech & Hearing and Physical & Learning Disabilities for six years. He is currently Zone Chair and 2nd Vice District Governor.

He has also chaired local sports clubs, including junior football teams and a running club. He has run 22 marathons with a personal best time of two hours 54 minutes.

As a Lion, he helps organise the annual Christmas Cracker night, an evening of festive entertainment and late-night shopping, and a summer beer festival.

He also took over the running of the talking news service for the East Staffordshire area, started by PDG John May of Lichfield Lions. Steve formed a separate trust with District Treasurer Rob Sunderland, ten volunteers were recruited and now nearly sixty visually impaired people get the weekly free service in East Staffordshire.

Lion Steve said: 'This is a great honour, and it's a tribute to all the work the Lions do in the town. It's great to see that being recognised, even if it is in an unusual way.'

Steve was joined at the supermarket opening by the town's mayor and the executive director of the nationally famous local racecourse. Proceeds from the beer festival were used to organise a prostate screening event at the racecourse in April, and another is planned for next year.
