International

Our International President is focusing on the forthcoming LEOs convention programme and stressing the need for our Lions Clubs to be 'youth aware' as, and it has been said before, youth is our future. We need to be looking at what Lions Clubs International offers to the young people of today, the future leaders of our communities tomorrow, rather than asking what



they can bring to Lions. Personally, I think it is a two-way street; we have to have an opportunity for mutual benefit for any and every individual who joins our organization.

Re-Zoning

It is fair to say that I have had some negative feedback from the recently announced rezoning. The essence of the adverse comment is that I have disregarded existing inter-club relationships established over many years. I would suggest that the current Zone boundaries are an equally artificial line drawn to meet the needs of the District as a whole as are those coming into effect on 1 July. The last time Zone boundaries were revised was from a position of growth in membership numbers and the number of clubs was increasing. Also, it was at a time when the average of the membership was some 20 years lower than it is today. My final point is that in the changes I have proposed there is nothing to stop a club maintaining existing relationships whilst establishing new ones within the revised Zone structure. However, it is equally fair to say that the adverse comments are far outweighed by the positive comments I have received. All I would ask is that all Lions and Clubs approach the changes with a positive attitude and remember if it shows in time that my decisions were in any way flawed further change can be made in the future.

Conventions

Manchester 2014 is fast approaching. This is your wider AGM and it is your chance to influence the direction your organization will take for the immediate and medium term future. The resolutions that will be debated have been circulated to clubs and it is your opportunity to present your views in the wider forum of the Multiple District. Full details of the timings and events are on the MD105 webpage and have been published in previous editions of the Newsletter.

Olivia Gandee was the winner of 105BS music competition sponsored by Sale and District Lions.




She is a 13 year old young lady who joined Chetham's in September 2008 and has been playing the French Horn since she was 8 years old initially being taught by her father.

GOT A SPARE BRIDGE ANYBODY??


Look out for the yellow chick brigade on the Iron Bridge!
