DG's Christmas Message



Dear fellow Lions

Santa's on his way! By the time you read this clubs will be getting into full Christmas mode, offering support to those in need and raising funds for club projects later in the (Lions) year.

In the build up to Christmas the month of November has been very busy....

I made clubs visits to Llandudno, Vale Royal and Rugeley and enjoyed wonderful charters at Leek, Macclesfield, City of Bangor and Vale Royal.

One of the highlights of my entire time as a Lions member was attending, with several other District Governors, the Remembrance Parade along Whitehall in London...what a humbling experience to be walking alongside thousands of veterans who served their country.



Another special moment was during the quarterly Cabinet meeting when we saw three candidates for the Young Ambassador competition. All three young people were outstanding but the individual chosen, Drew Morgan from Rugeley, was nominated by the independent judges to represent our District at the national finals in Dudley in February. I hope as many people as possible turn up to support her...Gillie and I will be there, shouting our support from the roof tops!

For the past several weeks , the DGT team have all been involved in further discussions on the proposed redistricting and changes to how the Multiple District is managed, aimed at reducing, or at least containing, our costs. All clubs have had a chance to see all of the proposals...for those who find the online documents too lengthy to read through, I have reduced them to a much shorter presentation which is available from zone chairs.

In simple terms, your Council of Governors is recommending that the number of Districts be reduced to seven from the current 12 – leaving Ireland to one side as its clubs will be voting at a special convention on December 5th whether to stay inside the MD or leave.

As far as our district is concerned the key elements are that seven zones (A to G) will move into a new District called CN while two zones (H and I) will become part of CW. The impact of these proposals will be communicated in the coming months.



I appreciate that clubs may have various questions on the details – please ask your zone chairs for answers and if they cannot help don't hesitate to contact me, 1st VDG Steve or 2nd VDG Teresa.

Finally, on a sad note West Wirral Lions club formally closed on November 16th. I want to thank them for their many years of service and wish every member the very best for the future.

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PPL - PRS Music Licences - What's the difference?

PPL collects and distributes money on behalf of record companies and performers.

PRS for Music collects and distributes money on behalf of songwriters, composers and publishers.

PPL

Lions Clubs International MD105 has secured an annual licence paid by MD on behalf of all Lions Clubs excluding Republic of Ireland to cover the PPL Licence. The Terms of our Licence are as follows:-

This fee will licence all recorded music usage by the club throughout the year except for events where the attendance is in excess of 500 persons which would then be licensed under the standard PPL tariffs.

The fees will increase annually on the 1st of January in line with the Retail Price Index.

Where a member club owns their own premises any use of the premises by third parties is not covered by this agreement.

PRS

PRS will not issue an annual licence as they appreciate many venues used by Lions already hold a licence for music.

However when individual Clubs contact PRS they will be treated as a charitable organisation and a more favourable licence rate will be given.

Please note it has been agreed that all Lions Clubs in the British Isles and Northern Ireland collecting at Christmas "Santa Sleigh" events will be exempt from a PRS for Music licence under their discretionary policy. This may change from year to year and MDHQ will be checking with them each year. We would appreciate Clubs informing us of any issues that arise.

If you require a copy of the license it is on the MD website it does expire December 2015 but a new one will be issued. So get your Christmas Music on.

Is Your Club Up to Date with DBS?

The Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) is an area in Lions that is thought by many to be intrusive and unnecessary. However in today's changing and challenging society, we must be seen to take all the necessary advice and precautions when working with vulnerable adults and children. We all undertake risk assessments for events that we carry out, of which DBS must be part of that procedure.

Many of our fund raising and community services are defined as "Regulated Activities", but what does this mean?

Regulated activities are services we provide on a regular basis such as:

- Providing transport for hospital appointments, GP appointments or visiting elderly partners in nursing establishments. Trips of days out are excluded.
- School involvement: whether it is classroom involvement or on the sports field.
- Transporting children to events.
- Chaperoning youths taking part in the Young Leaders in Service project.
- Youth Exchange
- Shopping for the housebound with their money.
- DBS to be taken into account in risk assessments.

Please remember, we can all become vulnerable at times, so be aware that what you think is a comforting touch when someone is upset, may be interpreted as an invasion of that person's individual space.

Unfortunately we have had claims made against Lions under the DBS scheme, and if prosecuted, this can affect your Club's insurance. It is recommended that, in order to comply with Lions guidelines, Club members register with the DBS scheme. It is an easy process, takes only minutes to complete and if you sign up to the "Up-Date" service and keep it valid, then there is no more application form filling. Using the "Up-Date" service also makes your certificate mobile, so if you should be in a position where a DBS is required, then the one you have could be used. However, always check that this is the case, because there are different levels to DBS.

One last word, with Santa waiting in the wings, as long as he isn't left alone with a child or invites children to sit on his knee, then he doesn't require a DBS. Always encourage Santa's helpers or a parent to be present.

Bridgnorth Club Exceeds 700 Men at PSA Screening

Bridgnorth Lions completed another successful PSA screening session with more than 700 men being tested in a single session. This is believed to be the largest session ever conducted in the United Kingdom.

After the results were analysed consultant urologist, David Baxter-Smith, estimated that at least 40 local men potentially have prostate cancer.

This was the seventh year that Bridgnorth Lions have organised the screening – during that time more than 4,000 men have been tested, an estimated 200 of whom have been found to have prostate cancer.

The vast majority of the men who attended were from Bridgnorth but there were some who came from nearby villages. More than half the men were between 50 and 70 years of age.

Bridgnorth Lions President, Tom Browne, said: "The club would like to thank all the sponsors of the evening which helped fund the event. We receive fantastic support from the local community which recognises that this is a potentially life saving programme for many local men.

"In addition we are delighted that other clubs in our District, such as Newport, Uttoxeter and Stone have developed their own screenings, providing the same service to their local men."

Bridgnorth Lions have also sent information packs and offered practical advice and help to several other clubs throughout the country.
