Knutsford Lions Celebrate Magna Carta at Street Fayre

Knutsford & District Lions promoted President Peter Willgoose to the role of "King John" at this year's Street Fayre on Bank Holiday Monday 25 May, with members supporting him (or otherwise?) as "Barons", "Ladies" and "Villein Paul de Beer" (Not villain! — who considered he was not dressed smartly enough to be a "Baron"). The theme was 800 years since the Magna Carta - special costumes were obtained from the local Little Theatre (including a colourful "Jester to King John"!) and the Club involved the Knutsford Academy Studio to convert the Lions stall into a mini Castle. As usual other stallholders were encouraged to support the year's theme, and after a tour of the street by the judging panel — "King John", "The Earl of Knutsford" (Knutsford Town Mayor) and "Queen Sofia de May" (Knutsford Royal May Queen) a prize was awarded to the Knutsford Promenades stall which was deemed most appropriately adorned.

It is 25 years since Knutsford Lions first started their Annual Street Fayre in King "John's" Street and it is now well established as a popular Community Event involving many local organisations/groups. In particular many local charities/community groups regularly take stalls to raise funds for their organisations - this year including the Knutsford Scouts who ran the popular street barbecue and a group from a local Pre-School providing excellent face painting which included that of our own Lion and a beard for "King John". Other stallholders included Urmston and Wilmslow Lions Clubs, the Town Council promoting their Town Awards scheme and a mixture of Traders – many of whom come regularly because they enjoy the atmosphere! We arrange for various street entertainments which this year included "Jongleur Eckie de Thump", three Minstrels (Gary de Lute, lan de Fiddle and Tony de Bass) and a traditional street organ grind-

er

Our main source of income from the event is from donations for programmes. This pays for the entertainment and also allows us to promote the work of the Club in our local Community. This year we received valuable help from local Guides and Scouts, and members of the Knutsford Hosts who provide manpower support to a large number of local events.

The real King John would no doubt have been irritated that so many people came out to celebrate 800 years since the Magna Carta — with which he never really wanted to be involved. Needless to say Lion-King John and his Barons and Ladies were delighted with the turnout! Overall the event raised a surplus of over £2000 for the Club's "coffers", but more importantly it allowed many other local groups to raise several thousand pounds, as well as providing family entertainment for thousands of people over the day.

During my year as the DG's partner in 2012/13, my charity was Hearing Dogs for Deaf People, which is a national charity and centre of excellence for training hearing dogs to alert deaf people to everyday household sounds such as the alarm clock, doorbell, and telephone as well as danger signals like smoke alarms in the home, workplace and in public buildings. Hearing Dogs was launched in 1982 and since then, they have created over 1,600 life-changing partnerships between deaf people and hearing dogs in the U.K.

I selected this charity as it fits in well with Lions focus on Health issues and on those people with disabilities. Your generous donations enabled me to pass almost £8,000 to this charity and it was used towards the costs of training a puppy called Rusty with the skills needed to become an effective companion for a deaf person and radically improve their standards of life.



I am pleased to report that Rusty has progressed well and will soon be fulfilling his role as an efficient aide for a deaf person. He has certainly become a handsome young pup!

International Club Visit

What an interesting club visit! My daughter Sarah and I visited a club in the middle of the Dominican Republic whilst on holiday there. It took almost two hours to get there in a taxi, through many villages full of abject poverty but filled with smiling people. In one such village we passed a small motorbike with a man collecting his 3 children from school, they looked immaculate in their school uniforms. We also passed many lottery booths - these people live in hope.

Arriving at the meeting place, we were greeted by the President of the El Seibo Lions Club, Guillermina Mercedes Avila and several other Lions. We spoke little or no Spanish, and they spoke no English. Fortunately, through a very helpful receptionist at our hotel, who had also organised our taxi driver, they had arranged for a lady to come to the meeting to act as a translator - what a relief!

The meeting place was open on 3 sides so we had an alfresco meeting. We were served with local drinks and biscuits. They asked many questions, as did we, and the young translator learned a lot about Lions Clubs International as she translated for us all. The building had been given to the Lions Club and they were wanting to transform it into a Vision Centre and Medical Walk-in Clinic for the local community. The club has 34 members but,

despite this, their fundraising efforts are very limited because of the very nature of the community in which they serve.

We went back to our respective clubs, told them our story and are looking into ways that we can help the Lions of El Seibo Club to achieve their aims. Watch this space!

Each month details of one of them will feature in the newsletter but to begin here is a list of what we, as a Multiple District, aim to achieve by the end of 2017.

Plant 100,000 trees and 100,000 bulbs

Recycle 1,000,000 pairs of spectacles, 10,000 hearing aids and 1,000,000 batteries

Fund 100,000 measles vaccinations and 100, 000 Ebola vaccinations

Run sessions for 100,000 prostate screenings and 100,000 diabetes screenings

Make 100,000 befriending calls to the elderly and donate 100,000 pints of blood

Walk, swim or run for a good cause

Feed 100,000 hungry people

Use LEHP to refer 100,000 for sight tests

Encourage young people to give 100,000 hours of service via YLIS

Clear 100 miles of paths

Sponsor training for 14 hearing dogs (2 in Ireland, 1 each in other districts)

Having collected over 50,000 pairs of spectacles in recent years, Tamworth Lions became eligible for a £500.00 grant, which of course we wanted to donate to The Talking Newspaper.
