LLandudno Lions then provided a picnic lunch before the group made their way down to the beach for a paddle in the very cold sea. We all then walked along the prom to a local pub where we were joined by the Mayor and Mayoress of Llandudno. Delicious seaside fish and chips were on the menu. A healthy dose of sea air earlier in the day meant that plates were soon emptied! Leek and Llandudno's partnership clearly demonstrated how much can be achieved by working together. It was an honour to be invited to join in the day. We were only sorry to miss the early part of the day as traffic was heavy and it took us several hours to reach Llandudno!

News from District & Deadlines Flag of Nepal

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The Nepali flag with its two overlapping red triangles has the distinction of being the only non-quadrilateral flag in the world. The flag in its current shape was adopted as the national flag on December 16, 1962, while it had been in use for over two centuries with two separate independent pennants. The crimson color of the flag denotes the bravery of the people while the blue border signifies the national ethos built upon peace and harmony. Likewise, the sun and the moon respectively stand for the eternal fire of life and the blissful serenity of the soul.

Milton Hayes, The Little Yellow Idol to the North of Kathmandu. Something we know of but dismiss all too quickly. A strange opening to this article you may wonder. However all will become clear. In 2013 a member of our Lions Club met up with some students from Endon High School Nr Leek packing bags to raise funds to visit Kuleshwor Awas Secondary school in Kathmandu. It was decided by our club to offer some financial support in their endeavours. The following year a party of students and staff visited the school in Kathmandu as part of a global school partnership project.

We also started the Young Leaders in Service project with the school, as all their community work towards the trip would obviously count towards the award. In January of this year DG Carole presented 10 awards to the participating students, such was the success that another 20 are now engaged in the project for this year. It soon became clear from the headteacher that her opposite number at the Kuleshwor School was not only the

headteacher but also a past president of the Eureka Lions Club of Kathmandu. He expressed a wish to get in touch with our club and form a formal communication partnership. So headteacher Megh Raj Dulal was given our contact details and has been receiving monthly minutes. PR reports and the District Newsletter over the last twelve months. During my year as the DG's partner in 2012/13, my charity was Hearing Dogs for Deaf People, which is a national charity and centre of excellence for training hearing dogs to alert deaf people to everyday household sounds such as the alarm clock, doorbell, and telephone as well as danger signals like smoke alarms in the home, workplace and in public buildings. "Hearing Dogs" was launched in 1982 and since then, they have cre-

ated over 1,600 life-changing partnerships between deaf people and hearing dogs in the U.K.



I selected this charity as it fits in well with Lions focus on Health issues and on those people with disabilities. Your generous donations enabled me to pass almost £8,000 to this charity and it was used towards the costs of training a puppy called Rusty with the skills needed to become an effective companion for a deaf person and radically improve their standards of life.

I am pleased to report that Rusty has progressed well and will soon be fulfilling his role as an efficient aide for a deaf person. He has certainly become a handsome young pup!
