



# DG message for October

Dear fellow Lions

One of the best elements of being a member of the District Governor team is visiting clubs, either at their business meetings or at their social events.

Clubs run their meetings in many different ways...some are fairly formal or business like in the way they conduct their meetings with strict agendas and so on.....others far less so with almost an air of having a chat between friends ! For me, it doesn't matter what they do because they all have the same objectives...helping out in their communities and, occasionally, further afield.



This past month I have visited Alsager, Barton, Birkenhead, Hednesford, Sale and Wilmslow and attended charters at Cannock and Telford. Two of those visited, Barton and Hednesford, are branch clubs of Lichfield and Cannock

respectively. In both places I was really impressed by the members who were very keen to expand their activities and eventually develop into independent clubs. Hednesford has been going for a while and is getting close to the magic number of 20 required to become a full club. Here's wishing President Shaun Middleton every success in reaching this number !

Talking of branch clubs, I must pay tribute to the team working on opening up a branch in Penkridge, near Stafford. Under the leadership of IPDGCarole Godden, several members of the Stafford club, especially Dave Lewis and Ron Martin, have done a fantastic job in developing and arranging the details of an info evening for potential members to be held in Penkridgeon October 8<sup>th</sup>. We'll report back on how they got on next month.

I mentioned last month that discussions are taking place on the way in which our Multiple District (MD) is governed...and how many Districts we have (currently 13). Both of these topics are really important because they involve the future of Lions in this country in the long term, as well as the costs of running the organization.

Both 1<sup>st</sup> VDG Steve and myself, together with PDG Shirley Vaughan, attended a full day communication/ information day in Solihull, with representatives from every District.2<sup>nd</sup>VDG Teresa is also involved, liaising with 2<sup>nd</sup> VDGs from other Districts to make sure we get the widest input. Two working groups – one looking at the way the organisation is run, the other looking at the number of districts - will report back to the Council of Governors with their findings at the next meeting on October 23-25.

Finally, several clubs have asked what the overall Lions organisation is doing regarding the increasingly difficult situation regarding migrants, many of whom are now being housed in temporary camps. For information Lions has already provided \$250,000 specifically for refugee camps in Syria while LCIF has also provided grants to support refugee camps in Jordan and Lebanon. International President Yamada has challenged Lions in all countries that have taken refugees to contact national and local governments to offer assistance.

### V-FEST 2015

Thirteen members of Gnosall Lions again for the 6<sup>th</sup> consecutive year, over the course of 2 days partook in the cleanup which followed the VFest in Weston Park, Staffordshire over 17<sup>th</sup> & 18<sup>th</sup> August. The local Rotary Club invited along Lions Clubs, Soroptomists, Freemasons etc to assist them in recycling various items left behind by Festival goers. On the first day they were looking which could be used by emergency agencies and Christian organisations. Items such as tents, bedding, chairs, airbeds etc. were rescued. These were all sent to a charity cleaning and

distribution centre for sorting and redistribution . At the end of the first day it came as a surprise e to meet up with an old friend and Past District Governor and now Rotarian, **Malcolm Hallewell** who was also involved on the day. Many of the items collected last year went to Nepal to aid in the disaster and one should imagine that many items this year are somehow destined for areas around Syria.

The following morning, clubs and organisations had the opportunity to collect for their own good causes and use for distribution within their own localities. On the day we collected tentage, chairs, trolleys, buckets, sleeping bags etc and also assisted the Stafford House of Bread which assists local homeless, which was a worthwhile exercise.

Our group included members of our club, led by DO Lion President Pam Talbot, members of our immediate family and a visitor from Spain. This was, well organised by Lion John Ison who liaised with the Rotarians. I should add that we have a very good relationship with a couple of local Rotary Clubs and also work together on other ventures such as Santa's sleigh.

We can fully recommend the initiative and would love to see other Lions Clubs apart from ourselves and Ironbridge and Severn Gorge Lions assisting. Well over 50% of the site was not cleared as we ran out of time. Once the site closed at 1-00pm on the Tuesday, any tents etc were bulldozed and went to landfill. I wonder if the same happens after the Chelmsford V Fest and the Reading Festival, if not then they should get involved.

# **Centenary News**

Now is the time to think about and plan for the centenary planting targets.

Plant 100,000 trees and 100,000 bulbs





Autumn is key planting time for both of these.

Trees may be single specimens or young saplings which can be obtained from the Woodland Trust in packs of 100 or 400, in a range of varieties to suit the chosen location. They will advise on ap-

propriate species.

Most garden centres will offer bulk packs of bulbs or these can be ordered on line. Suitable varieties for naturalising include narcissi, crocus, bluebells (use the English variety if possible), winter aconite and wood anemones. The Royal Horticultural Society offers lists of species suitable for most areas.

Don't forget the actual planting is a great opportunity to involve the local community and youth groups in particular in doing something that will enhance the environment for years to come.

We have this year and next year to plant ready for 2017 and make a show for our 100 years, so major projects could be split to make them more manageable. If your club is not ready to plant this autumn start planning now for next year or look to see what might be suitable to do in the spring.
