DG Message for June

Knutsford & District Lions Club Young Leaders in Service Awards

At the Annual Town Meeting of Knutsford last Wednesday 20th April 2016, the first Knutsford Lions Young Leaders in Service awards were made. The scheme was inaugurated by Knutsford & District Lions Club in collaboration with Knutsford Town Council in November 2014 and forms part of a world-wide initiative by Lions clubs to engage young people in voluntary service. Each youngster who volunteers is given a logbook and a Young Leaders' badge, and the services they perform, from a very wide range of possible activities, is then recorded in the logbook throughout the year. Those reaching 50 hours in a year get a Silver award and those achieving 100 hours, a Gold award.



At the beginning of the meeting, the first awards since the scheme started were presented by the Town Mayor, Councillor Tony Dean, and the Knutsford Lions Vice-President Sonia Amos, to the applause of those present.

Five Silver and four Gold awards in total were presented.

Sharing ideas across the Zones - this month Zone H focusing on Hearing dogs and Prostate cancer

Bridgnorth and Newport Lions Clubs have continued their prostate cancer screenings. As a result hundreds of local men have had the opportunity for a PSA test and a number were identified for further investigation. The early identification and treatment that come from the screenings can and does save lives. Prostate cancer kills 10,000 men every year. One man dies every hour and 41,000 new cases are diagnosed every year. This means that every single day about 110 men come home to tell their families that they have Prostate Cancer. This cancer is usually curable if diagnosed and treated early enough but currently there is no national screening programme in the UK.

Ironbridge and Severn Gorge Lions braved the weather on a wet and soggy Bank Holiday Sunday to collect their line of Silver over the Bridge from visiting tourists. They were joined by Hearing Dogs Piper and Harley. The result of their sterling efforts was a significant donation to Hearings for Deaf People.

Telford Lions and friends willingly sacrificed their waistlines when they attended *Afternoon Tea with LP*. They left behind a few crumbs, empty plates, a mountain of used teabags and another £215 for the club's Hearing Dogs fund. A Nearly New sale and a raffle bring the total raised to £540 for the cause.

The Peace Pole

The Peace Pole project was started in Japan in 1955 in response to the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. These hand crafted monuments have been erected all over the world as international symbols of peace in places where people gather. World political leaders and religious leaders like Mother Theresa, the Dalai Lama and Pope John Paul 2, have dedicated them to world peace.

The Justice, Peace and Integration of Creation (JPIC) of Alsager and Nantwich, under the leadership of Rev Dr B. Hudson and Mrs Bernice Halson acquired the Peace Pole with the intention of erecting it in Alsager Town Centre, but the Cheshire East Council was concerned about the insurance, the security and maintenance of this prestigious pole and were unable to take on the responsibility. The JPIC not being a funded organisation was unable to handle it and so it was temporarily forgotten. The pole was left in the safe keeping of Mr Geoffrey White of Alsager for its safe keeping, hoping that something could be done about it later.

At the beginning of this year Alsager Lions were contacted by Mr Geoffrey White to see if they would take on the responsibility of the Peace Pole and it was agreed that they would take on the installation of it and to seek final approval from the local authorities. The Town Council were contacted and were delighted that the Lions would take on the project and gave their approval for it to be erected and maintained and this solved the problem which had been in abeyance for a couple of years.

It has now been installed at the Alsager Peace Garden on Crewe Road by the White Moss Quarry Gate at Radway Green, for all those travelling from the Crewe direction into Alsager to see.

Alsager Lions which to thank the Cheshire East Council and Alsager Town Council for their approval of the project, Geoffrey White for looking after it and mainly Lions Anton Selvadurai for leading the project on behalf of the Lions club.

We hope that the JPIC are delighted that after some 3 years their pole has found a resting home
