LIONS CENTENARY FAIR

In early 2016 Ian Young, one of our longest serving members, challenged Knutsford Lions to turn the Street Fair, which we have held annually for over 20 years in King Street, into a much bigger Centenary Fair in 2017. Ian was full of ideas and was instrumental in securing the use of Knutsford Heath with the aim of involving other Lions Clubs and creating opportunities for others to raise funds for their own charities or local organisations. Unfortunately he passed away last December after a long battle with cancer – leaving the Club and his family with a legacy to fulfil!

After a lot of work by the Club, with support from District Officers, the Lions Centenary Fair took place on Bank Holiday Monday 29 May and turned out to be one of the most successful Lions events that Knutsford have ever organised! Most of all we are grateful for the support of all the Lions Clubs who turned out in force on the day with their gazebos, games and wide variety of activities. It was also great to see so many Lions in costume entering into the spirit of the day by joining in the Tug of War, participating in the "Pride of Lions" Competition (thanks to Carole Godden for the idea and implementation) and parading for the "Big Friendly Lion" Competition.

Ian Young's family took an active part on the day by setting up and manning a number of activities in the Childrens area – including taking up our Welly Wanging theme with a children's "Design a Welly Painting" Competition

As the organisation progressed Knutsford Lions were amazed at the local response when we mentioned that the Fair this year marked the Centenary of the Lions Organisation. The Knutsford Heritage Centre offered to put on an exhibition for the Centenary and local businesses were incredibly generous in donating a wide variety of prizes for our Lions Centenary Raffle.

The local Mayor and Royal May Queen regularly attend our Street Fairs – this year Ruby Barnhill (Sophie in BFG) joined them to judge the "Big Friendly Lion" Competition.

With the larger venue we were able to create a much bigger Community Event involving Lower Moss Wood Nature Reserve/Animal Hospital with Birds of Prey, Friends of the Moor with various large scale childrens games, Scouts help with car parking, tents and barbecue, Knutsford SciBar with their rocket launcher, as well as the usual local charities, organisations and traders with their market stalls. Then there was also the Welly Wanging which had over 250 competitors throughout the day, and many entries into our Pooch Competitions which was organised by our two youngest members.

So thanks to lan's initiative we had a great celebration for the Centenary of Lions and we hope all the other Clubs who took part enjoyed the day – some might even return to our Fair again next year?

May 2017 saw Newcastle Lions achieve 30 years as a Lions Club. A huge variety of fundraising activities have been undertaken in that time, as well as a diverse range of donations made to organisations and individuals. The 30 years of the Club and 100 years of Lions International is being celebrated by thirty grants of £100 being made over the year. These are available by application, to organisations based in the Ancient Borough (Newcastle's Market was Chartered in 1173). Two presentation nights have already taken place, on the occasions of the Club's birthday and Lions International's birthday and the scheme will be completed in Lions Awareness Week in October.

There are four Charter Members still active in the Club and one of them, Lion Treasurer John Jones (pictured with DG Steve) received a 30-year perfect attendance award. A rare achievement and a rare presentation for the Governor to make.

LICHFIELD LIONS' 100 Metres of £1 Coins

Spring bank holiday Monday is Bower Day in Lichfield. The origins of the bower go back many centuries to the time of Henry II (1145-1189) and the Courte of Arraye. Today we have a procession of tableaux, Morris Men and marching bands.

Lichfield Lions have, in recent years, helped with marshalling duties, but this year we decided to celebrate our Centenary with a quest for 100 metres of £ coins. We were very grateful to Midland Building Plastics (with branches in Lichfield, Burton, and Derby) who supplied us with all the plastic strips and volunteered a £100 donation to get us started. With some quite considerable effort, by our President and a couple of members, we secured another 30 sponsors of 1 metre - £45.

Our stall was set up in Beacon Park with all the sponsors' money displayed securely. With help from 7th Lichfield Scouts group, we were kept quite busy with members of the public adding their £coins to the 30 or so metres on display until the rain came down at about 2:30. Umbrellas went up and people took shelter under the trees, but after half an hour of very heavy rain, there was a scurry to the exits and the Bower celebrations came to an untimely end.



We had collected around £300 (6+ metres), but had the weather held up, we think that we would have collected somewhere around £1000.

Our quest will continue throughout the year at other events. We are quietly confident that our 40+ metres will grow to 100, bringing us an income of more than \pounds 4,000.
