Copious Cuppas in Telford, Part 2

Well we did it. The Big Build is done, Matthew and his family are home at last in a building suited for his needs. It was a fantastic experience to be part of such a superb enterprise.

From the first day it was amazing to watch as so many tradespeople converged on the site with deliveries coming in and waste going out at a fair rate. Organising the logistics must be a mammoth task but all appeared to go pretty smoothly. Around 100 volunteers signed in most days which kept the tea makers busy all day long.

The club was amazed at the community responselocal businesses donated all the bottled water, tea, coffee, milk, sugar and even paper cups along with loads of biscuits and cakes. Club members, family and friends began a frenzy of baking to ensure fresh stocks daily. After publicity in the local press at the half way stage kind individuals began turning up on site with even more cakes which gave the club's bakers a bit of a break.

The workforce and the BBC team were very appreciative of the service we were giving - one team commented on Facebook "a big thank you to the Telford Lions for all your support on the big build. We could not do this without you and your endless supply of tea, coffee and not forgetting all the cakes. Remember, every builder likes his tea and without you nothing would get done!"

It was a challenging task, serving an estimated 500 drinks a day from a small gazebo on a crowded building site. As we were on site



everyday we also ended up manning the daily signing in, the issue of personal protection equipment and even the gates at the site entrances some of the time.

Although filming in February and March meant it was cold and wet at times it was very satisfying to be part of such a fantastic effort. So many were involved providing their labour and skills, equipment and materials; neighbours gave over their drives for parking porta cabins and stock; some even had their own garden fences taken down to provide access to the garden. It truly was a great community effort and we all felt it so worthwhile when Matthew and his family came to see the finished product. The alterations mean that he can come home at last and will ease many of the practical problems his family face in caring for him.

"We serve" is our motto though we don't usually take it quite so literally! We guestimate that over the 9 days of the build we served about 5,000 drinks and provided around 3,500 cakes.

It was hard work but so rewarding – would we do it again? - without hesitation - but not for a week or two!

Prostate Cancer Screening Event is a 'Sell-out'

Ironbridge & Severn Gorge Lions staged their first prostate cancer screening event in March, after months of fundraising to pay for testing kits and flyers and considerable trepidation about the success potential of 'a first' of this magnitude.

The project also claimed another 'first', as to ensure sufficient funds were available the 14-member club invited Ironbridge Rotary Club to join forces as well as making a successful application for Lottery funding.

Surprise, and relief, came with the number of enquiries received after the Ironbridge Lions' initial media campaign. Subsequent growing confidence in success resulted in the club increasing its order for testing kits.

Then followed even more media interest after former world boxing champion, Richie Woodhall, whose father Len died after an eight-year battle with the disease, threw his weight behind the event. More local resident enquiries came flooding in, more radio interviews were given..... and at the last minute the club decided to take a risk and boost the testing kit order again.

Ironbridge Lions Club President, John Marsh, takes up the story:

"On the due evening, men were queuing up half an hour before the doors opened. We looked out through the window ten minutes later and the queue had disappeared down the street and round the corner.

"After 3 hours every available testing kit had been used and sadly we had to turn the last few men away. However, we know of two more Lions clubs in the area that will be holding similar events in the next few months and we have undertaken to forward details of those events to all the people we could not test.

"This was the first time we had staged such an event as this and as the kits cost £15 each we were understandably nervous about over-ordering. Never in a million years did we envisage that the 420 kits we ordered would be insufficient.

"The success of this event shows there is a massive need for a national prostate cancer screening programme, but until this happens we shall continue to raise the money to stage further screening events and would urge other Lions clubs to do the same.

"It must be said, however, that none of this would have been possible without the generous time given freely by retired Consultant Urological Surgeon, Mr David Baxter-Smith who supplied and supervised the blood tests and the seven nurses and phlebotomists who took the blood samples."

Our standard commercial gazebos are 6m x 3m and are usually split into two 3m x 3m stall areas. Bridgnorth Lions Invite Clubs to Enter Major Charity Walk

Calling all Lions in District BS ! Bridgnorth Lions have taken over the organisation of the biggest charity event in Shropshire...and YOUR CLUB has the chance to enter a team !

After being organised by various volunteers for the past fifty years Bridgnorth Lions are now running the event on Monday May 29th.

The walk raises at least £100,000 every year for charity and regularly attracts 600-700 walkers. Under 40's walk the 22 miles from Bridgnorth to the Brown Clee Hill and back while the over 40's do a slightly shorter walk. There is also a seven mile walk for youngsters in school years 5-9.

Operations committee chairman, PDG Chris Aked, said: "We'd love to see clubs from around the District taking part – it's an amazing, fun day, with fantastic community spirit. While there are a few seriously fit walkers the vast majority do the walk to enjoy themselves while raising money for their own charities"

Chris said that Bridgnorth Lions decided to take over running the walk because many of the existing committee members felt it was time to step down. Chris added: "This is such a great event that we didn't want it to stop so we decided to take it on. It would be great if other Lions clubs entered teams and raised funds for their own charities".

Entry is only £15 per person (to pay for the event costs) while all the money raised by individuals goes to their own charities.

Chris said: "As a Club we expect to raise several thousand pounds for Lions charities by sponsorship and charging for food and other concessions in Bridgnorth high street."

HEDNESFORD LIONS IN BID TO BAG TESCO FUNDING

Hednesford Centennial Lions Club are bidding to bag a cash boost from the Tesco 'Bags of Help' initiative to fund improvements to Hednesford War Memorial.

Tesco have kindly accepted our nomination to be part of their Bags of Help community funding scheme, which sees grants of $\pm 5,000, \pm 2,000$ and $\pm 1,000 -$ all raised from the 5p bag levy – being awarded to local community projects.






District News

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Megan Montford, from Gnosall Lions Club represented Lions District 105BS in the prestigious UK Multi District Final of the Young Ambassador Competition 2017 held in February at the Village Hotel in Dudley. Megan was one of 13 youngsters between the ages of 15 and 18 competing for a £1000 Bursary for their own specific charity initiative, and the Lions Rose Bowl Trophy.

The competitors' achievements were as diverse as saving a run-down public park and bringing it up to Britain in Bloom standard, loud shirt days raising £420,000 for deaf children, anti-bullying initiatives, teaching music and busking, and a variety of other amazing works. All of this achieved whilst in the majority of cases studying for their A Levels, GCSE's or College qualifications, having a part time job and also living a normal life. When any of them slept, I'll never know!

Our own District Winner Megan Montford came into the competition late and, after another candidate sponsored by Stoke on Trent Lions withdrew, only had a short time to prepare for her presentation to cabinet in November. It was then agreed that she would be given some guidance before her next presentation in Dudley. However, with all of her commitments this was easier said than done! Megan is the current Lord Lieutenant's Cadet and required on duties with him on high level visits including Royal ones, she teaches Kick Boxing in her spare time, also teaches young cadets and works part time at the trampoline Park in Stone as an instructor, and she has her own college studies to complete! A very busy young lady. Despite this and with support from her mother and Glenys Sanders from Stone Lions club, we did manage to work with her on improving her delivery skills.

Friday night at Dudley was a Fun Night with buffet, an ice-breaker for all competitors. On Saturday each entrant was interviewed by the judges and also enjoyed a session of ten-pin bowling. This was followed by a fabulous Gala Dinner with disco and impromptu entertainment by the contestants. Megan, a leading light in these activities, had a great time.

Sunday morning was time for the Presentation Ceremony presided over by MD105 Young Ambassador Committee Chair Lion Glenys Sanders (of Stone club) with Past International Director Lion Phil Nathan, Council Chair Heather Jeavons and several civic leaders in attendance. Each candidate gave a 3 minute



presentation to an audience, in excess of 150 people; a very daunting experience. Megan was not declared the overall winner although, as was stated from the podium, all of the 13 candidates were winners in their own right. As district winner, she was presented with a trophy for her achievements, together with a cheque for £600 on top of the £100 from Gnosall, all of which is going towards her project in assisting in a village community in South Africa. She visited this area last year as one of the winners of the Duke of Westminster's Award, and which has transformed her life.



This Young Ambassador competition has been a huge success for many years, and for the last 3 years much of this has been due to the dedication and literally hundreds of hours committed by Lion Glenys Sanders of Stone club. Congratulations Glenys for a great event, and huge thanks from all, not least all of the candidates, for which many, the YA event has a lasting marked effect on their community work.
