Lichfield Lions Help CHICKS

Prepare for New Season

John & Ann Whitehouse from Lichfield Lions Club went to help other volunteers prepare the new site at Fenny Bentley, just north of Ashbourne for their first intake of underprivileged children.

CHICKS (Country Holidays for Inner City KidS) offer adventure holidays to underprivileged children between 8 and 15 years old. CHICKS have been going for 25 years in Devon and Cornwall, taking kids from all over the country. In 2015 they purchased this site in Derbyshire so that kids from the north of England could attend.



Zone I took on CHICKS as their Zone project in 2015-6 and donated £1,800 to help with purchasing and replacing various items of sports equipment. Unfortunately, due to lack of funds, the new site, "Daleside", was only able to open to guests for a few weeks, but this year they have decided to make Daleside one of their main retreats.

John and Ann were set tasks like cleaning up the equipment in the Arts & Crafts room, and later joined a group from a special school in Coventry to shovel several tonnes of gravel.

Lichfield and Rugeley Lions are hoping to give further assistance to CHICKS at Daleside as a number of their guests are Young Carers, and Zone I have been supporting CASS (Carers Association South Staffs) for many years until they lost the contract to help Young Carers a couple of years ago.

"We have been excited to welcome the first group of children on a break here at Daleside last week and the place has been transformed with the sound of them clattering around in the barns and enjoying all we have to offer here at the retreat (well until they go

offsite at least!)

As well as enjoying lots of time for 'free play' in the barns and outside (because let's face it, the weather has been glorious here in Fenny Bentley), the children on the break were able to take part in a number of exciting off-site activities,

including walks in the beautiful Derbyshire countryside, whizzing down the water slides at the leisure pool, reaching the dizzy heights of the climbing wall at a local adventure centre and even bottle feeding some lambs at a neighbouring farm.





We had one volunteer comment that she was 'amazed how much the children grow in such a short space of time.'

In fact, one of our individual successes was a very shy child proclaim that this was the most friends he has ever had and it was great to see his confidence soar from not being able to hold a conversation with people at the start of the week to being a lad who was perfectly happy to chat to anyone."



Birkenhead Festival Appeal

On the 9th -10th September 2017 a Festival organised by the Merseyside Welsh Heritage Society, Friends of Birkenhead Park, Birkenhead Lions, Wirral Council and the Snowdonia National Park Authority will be held in Birkenhead Park in Merseyside.

It seeks to promote the historic links between Wales and Merseyside, through a range of cultural and heritage events linked to the National Eisteddfod of Wales which was held in Birkenhead Park in September 1917. On 6th September 1917, the ceremony of Chairing the Bard took place at the National Eisteddfod in Birkenhead Park, in the presence of the Prime Minister, David Lloyd George. As was the custom, the main prize for this annual celebration of Welsh literature and culture would be a specially designed bardic chair. The winning poet was Hedd Wyn (born Ellis Humphrey Evans), for a traditional Welsh poem entitled 'Yr Arwr' (The Hero). When the winner was announced, no-one stepped forward – Hedd Wyn had been killed in Flanders six weeks previously as has so many other young people of that generation.

The empty chair was draped in a black cloth and was taken back to Hedd Wyn's family farmhouse in Snowdonia, where it remains today - a potent symbol for all the empty chairs in homes after the First world War. We want to use the 'Black Chair' story to engage schools in Merseyside and throughout Wales giving a history of World War I, while also exploring and sharing an understanding of Welsh culture and the historic links between Wales and Birkenhead.

There will be as part of the celebration an open poetry competition within the Eisteddfod tradition, for young people aged 11 - 19 on the theme of 'The Hero' - the subject of the original 1917 winning poem. This will be promoted in Welsh schools and colleges as well as locally and entrants will be able to use English or Welsh. Ten winners will be invited to perform as part of the Festival in September. Two tradition Crowns will be awarded to the winning entries, one in Welsh and the other in English.

In addition there will be welsh music / entertainment provided by choirs drawn from several schools on Anglesey, the North Wales Rugby Choir and the Harpist Dylan Cernyw and the Rhos Ophreus Male Voice Choir and I am sure several other choirs, singers and poets etc.

Although this is not a District appeal on behalf of my Lions Club, Birkenhead, I have to try to raise funds from various organisations to assist with items like transportation of the choirs, supplying two crowns and also the striking of at least 500 commemorative medals. If any Club or individual is able to make a donation please contact me.




Centenary News

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Hednesford Centennial Lions Club Charter Anniversary BBQ

On the 13th of May 2017 Hednesford Lions held their first charter anniversary at Marquis Drive on Cannock Chase A.O.N.B.

As a young club without traditions to follow or adhere to It was decided to break away from the usual black tie charter evenings and try something a little more unconventional. Eventually it was decided that we would hold a BBQ, in May, and hope that the weather gods would look favourably upon our 'bravery'. A local visitor centre, the site of the old RAF Hednesford camp, was selected as our venue and plans were formed. The afternoon would be simple, casual and accessible to all with friends and family encouraged to join our celebrations.
