"RIDE TO THE WALL"

Two members of Vale Royal Lions Club joined this year's charity Ride to The Wall event, which sees around 20,000 bikers from across the country join together at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire.

Lion David Mawson, who is Vice President of Vale Royal Lions Club, and his partner Lion Sue Scott joined the event at Knutsford Services on Saturday 7th October where around 500



bikers gathered to begin their journey.



This year is the 10th anniversary of the Ride to the Wall charity when bikers and their passengers gather at the memorial, which is engraved with the names of more than 16,000 service men and women killed since the end of the Second World War, for a service of commemoration.

"Ride to The Wall" is founded on the principles of Remembrance and Respect to remember those that can no longer ride by the side of bikers and to give all motorcyclists an opportunity to pay their respects to the memory of the fallen and express their gratitude for their sacrifice. It allows motorcycle enthusiasts show support for the Armed Forces currently serving both at home and abroad and to raise money for the upkeep of the venue that serves to perpetuate the memory of those who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

So if they can talk things through with someone who does not judge or ask them loads of questions, in a comfortable environment, and with Eric the dog to keep them company they can have a drink and relax.

Whitchurch and District Lions Club decided to help by supplying a Cooker Hood, 36 Dinner plates, side plates, Bowls, Knives, Forks, spoons and tea spoons. A 12lt Saucepan, a soup ladle, a set of 4 chopping boards and a stainless steel table.

Trainee leader Kerry Middleton immediately set about looking for alternative accommodation that could provide a fully trained team on site. A PGL Camp near Shrewsbury proved to be the ideal solution. The problem was that it came with a price tag way above the Brownie pack's budget.

Charlie Miller, President of Ironbridge Lions, said: "Determined not to disappoint the girls, Brownie leaders and parents started a massive fundraising exercise and Ironbridge Lions were delighted to respond to their appeal, offering the final helping hand that secured the deal."

Speaking after the trip, Brown Owl Pam Rollings said: "We had 18 Brownies attend the trip, aged between 7 and 10 years old.
